Her expertise spans microfinance, livelihoods, and women's empowerment, with a strong focus on sustainable community-driven development.





Who We Are

Hairakhan is a secluded village of BHIMTAL BLOCK of Nainital district. It's the oldest Kailash region so that makes this region pre-historic and has been a favorite destination of seekers around the world since centuries. Haidakhan grew in prominence after the sudden appearance great timeless Himalayan mystic Hairakhan Babaji who left his mortal coil in 1984. Therefore the work is dedicated to the late Himalayan mystic and its named Hairakhandhi Crafts is an initiative by New Age Learning Foundation aimed at creating a sustainable platform for the women of Hairakhan to earn a livelihood while staying rooted in their village. Through skill development in sewing, fashion design, and product designing, we empower local women to turn their craftsmanship into a source of income without having to migrate for work. Our vision is to provide opportunities for these women to thrive economically while preserving the unique cultural and natural beauty of Hairakhan. By connecting their traditional skills with modern markets, we aim to build a self-sufficient community where women can contribute to their household income while staying close to their families an their connection to their homeland.

First Meeting

An introductory meeting to understand the pulse and feedback from the local women. This laid the groundwork for tailoring the program to the community's needs. Dec '23

Silai Training Beginning

> Sewing training commenced at the newly launched center in Hairakhan. Women began learning the basics of stitching to build their skills.



First Assessment

May 24'

An evaluation was conducted to assess the participants' grasp of basic stitching techniques. This helped identify strengths and areas needing improvement.

Sewing Machine Training Focused on understanding the parts of the sewing machine, and how to operate and maintain it. This technical training ensured the women could work independently.



Kainchi Field Visit

The visit aimed to present their work to the public and gain real-world exposure.

Reassessment

A follow-up assessment where participants created finished products. This helped gauge their progress and readiness for the next steps.



2 Day Workshop

Fellowship Launch

The fellowship was launched to support the best-performing students by connecting them with mentors. The goal is to help them start their own businesses and become self-reliant.

Revision and Practice

Participants were encouraged to revise and practice their skills. Some were given sewing machines to continue honing their craft at home.



Online Selling Launch

We are preparing to launch online sales, where products made by the women will be available for purchase on various ecommerce platforms. This will help provide a sustainable income stream for the artisans.

Program inception

In early December 2023, the first meeting took place at the new Panchayat house in HairaKhan. Around 40 women, registered under NABARD, gathered to discuss potential livelihood opportunities.

Most of them expressed a desire to learn stitching, as it would allow them to work from home while managing their household and farming duties.

At NALF we divided on a decentralized income model with a training fee of ₹100 per month. This small fee was feasible for them, matching their existing SHG savings.





Second Meeting At old Panchayat House

On the Second meeting at the Old Panchayat house at Hairakhan, the date, time, fees and venue for the training was finalized.





Opening of Sewing center



On 14th February 2024, Sewing training began at Basant Homestay, with local trainer Meenakshi leading the program. Sewing machines and materials were provided, marking the start of their stitching journey.





Training and Assessment


Lalitha Negi from Bhowali came down and started the training, she also conducted the assessment after 3 months of training.

We also visited the local market, interacting with vendors and artists. This gave us insight into the local crafts and entrepreneurial spirit, connecting with individuals who shared their personal stories and the challenges of preserving traditional skills.

This visit was not only a spiritual journey but also a learning experience, helping us understand the cultural and economic dynamics of the region.




Sewing Workshop

Due to the challenges of the monsoon season, our trainer could not travel to Hairakhan to complete the training sessions. To ensure the completion of the program, we organized a two-day extensive workshop spread across two Sundays, held in Haldwani, led by a seasoned trainer in the field.

Two Day Workshop at Haldwani

1st Workshop:

• **Blouse with Lining**: Focused on essential techniques for stitching blouses with proper lining, providing hands-on experience in professional blouse-making.

• **Plazo Suit**: Covered designing and stitching stylish plazo pants, focusing on measurements, cutting, and sewing for a polished, professional look.

• **Neck Pattern**: Taught various neck pattern designs, equipping the women with skills to create versatile necklines for different outfits.

2nd Workshop:

- **Collared Kurti**: Training on diverse Kurti styles, including precise cutting, stitching, and measurements.
- **Bag**: Introduced bag-making techniques, enabling them to expand their product range.
- **Fancy Blouse**: Focused on intricate designs and stitching techniques for fashionable blouses.

Afterward, the women practiced these skills over the following week, ensuring they could confidently apply what they learned.




Geeta Arya- a budding entrepreneur

In the charming village of Tilwari, across from Hairakhan, lived Geeta Arya, a woman of many talents and aspirations. However, Tilwari's isolation, due to the treacherous GAUTAMI Ganga river, made travel to Hairakhan for sewing practice and business challenging.

Recognizing her struggle, the local organization NAL stepped in with a sewing machine, a gesture that became a turning point for Geeta. This gift transformed her home into a bustling sewing hub, allowing her to create and sell garments within her village. Her work quickly gained a reputation for quality, and she also became known for her woolen clothes. Inspired by her success, plans are underway for Geeta to train other women in Hairakhan in sewing and woolen garment production, potentially creating new opportunities for them. Geeta's journey from homemaker to entrepreneur illustrates the power of support systems and the broader impact of a single act of kindness in fostering resilience and community growth.

His dedication to learning this heritage craft at such a young age highlights the ongoing effort to preserve local traditions and pass them on to future generations.





Chakra Kamal

(Wheel of the Lotus) – This circular Aipan design features bold, symmetrical patterns symbolizing balance and unity. The intricate paisley-like shapes at the center are surrounded by delicate dots, adding elegance. The outer border ties the design together, creating a striking piece of traditional decoration.





Pahadi Phool






Cultural Symbols in Art



Additional Work



Menstrual Hygiene Workshop

In a session led by Hema Sammal, the women participated in an informative discussion on **menstrual hygiene and sanitary practices**. The session aimed to raise awareness about the importance of maintaining hygiene during menstruation, dispelling myths, and promoting open discussions on this often taboo topic. She spoke about the increasing number of cases of PCOD amongst the teenage girls due to poor appetite and preference for junk food. PCOD or polycystic ovarian disease is a reproductive health issue in females and occurs due to hormonal imbalances and genetic tendencies.

Following the session, sanitary pads were distributed among the participants to encourage the adoption of healthy practices, ensuring that they have the necessary resources for menstrual care. This initiative was a vital step towards improving the well-being and empowerment of the women in the community.
